Ninety-nine years ago ...

... leaders at Indiana University believed that a journalism program was important for the campus and the state. They established a Department of Journalism, one of the first academic departments of its kind in the world.

Today, the School of Journalism at Indiana University comprises nearly 1,000 students, 8,000 alumni across the globe, academic programs on the Bloomington and Indianapolis (IUPUI) campuses, and well-regarded degrees at the undergraduate, master's and doctoral levels.

In the past year, the School of Journalism won the Hearst Award, the nation's top prize for collegiate reporting; received the two largest undergraduate scholarship gifts in its 99-year history, from alumni who wanted to make a difference for young people and journalism in the future; held the first-ever event in Bloomington for the Indiana Journalism Hall of Fame, now based at IU; and sent students to learn about journalism and report from five continents.

Roy W. Howard Professor David Weaver received the Association for Education in Journalism and Mass Communication's Paul J. Deutschmann Award for Excellence in Research, given only 20 times since 1969. Staff members at the *Indiana Daily Student* and *Arbutus*, including many of our students, won national awards for overall publications and individual stories, photographs and section designs.

Awards and recognition are always nice. But in a broader sense, the impact of the School of Journalism during the past century has been felt in communities small and large throughout Indiana, the Midwest, the nation and the world as our graduates have applied their skills to careers in journalism and related fields.

Throughout the past 99 years, there also have been times of great challenge for the journalism field and for journalism education. As you know, the journalism industry is changing, and the recession — in the middle of this transformation — has created additional issues. State funding for IU and the School of Journalism declined significantly this year.

Yet we have great faith in the future of journalism and in the future of our school.

Our ability to teach and inspire the next generation of journalists has been built on the support of our alumni and friends. Thank you for your contributions, which help us to continue the century-old tradition of excellence at the Indiana University School of Journalism.

IU tops Hearst writing contest

The IU School of Journalism took top honors in the Hearst Journalism Awards Program, often called “the Pulitzers of college journalism.” The school won first place and a \$10,000 prize in the Intercollegiate Writing Competition. Junior Rachel Stark was one of eight student finalists who traveled to New York to compete in the national writing championships for individual students.

School of Journalism Dean Brad Hamm described IU’s first place finish as “amazing,” and compared the award to bringing home a national championship in journalism. The last time IU took top honors in the contest was in 1966, though individual students have won their categories over the years.

The competition consists of monthly contests focusing on different media. Schools accumulating the most points earned by their students in each category are designated the winners of the Intercollegiate Competitions.

Pulitzer Prize-winner Tom French, who is the visiting Riley Endowed Chair in Journalism at IU, knows well the feeling of winning in the Hearst competition as he won second place for writing in 1980. Now, he’s passing on that tradition to IU

students, many of whom, including Stark, placed high in the monthly competitions.

“I feel so fortunate to be a part of the IU School of Journalism, to be able to work with professors like Tom French, as well as fellow journalism students who share a passion for journalism and make me a better writer,” Stark said.

French said the real success is that students told important stories in engaging ways. The Hearst award is the bonus.

“An official stamp of validation never hurts,” said French, who praised the students for their hard work and diligence in terms of producing draft after draft of their competition stories. “Not letting go. Persistence. Tenacity. Everyone did it, and it was spectacular to watch.”

As part of the Hearst Journalism Awards Program’s 50th anniversary, the organization contacted former winners, asking them to reflect on their career paths and what winning the award meant to them. French said it was special to be able to remember his own experience with the competition as well as celebrate his students’ success.

“It was nice to come full circle this year,” said French.

Beth Wood's many legacies

When professor Beth Wood died in November from complications of treatment for lung cancer, she left many legacies. One legacy is the hundreds of public relations students who loved her energetic teaching style. Another legacy is the Beth Wood Award, which supports an international study experience for a journalism major.

Twelve years ago, Wood set up the award as an estate gift to support students with financial need and a record of academic excellence.

"The award gives us the ability to support students who might not otherwise be able to go abroad," said Dean Brad Hamm.

Wood, 58, taught public relations at the graduate and undergraduate levels and was a leader in service-learning classes in the School of Journalism that assisted many area nonprofits. She was a two-time winner of the Trustees Teaching Award in the School of Journalism.

Wood was a 1973 graduate of the IU School of Journalism and earned her law degree from the IU School of Law in Indianapolis in 1977. She joined the School of Journalism faculty in 2002.

Gifts such as Wood's can change the life of a young person, particularly someone who has never had the opportunity to be immersed in another culture, Hamm said.

"When we connect our students to the larger world, we allow them to learn about journalism and culture, about history and politics, about global and local issues" he said. "And we hope it will change their lives."

Changing students' lives through travel experiences

Four years ago, the percentage of IU journalism students who had traveled and studied abroad was right around the university average of 20 percent. This year the school is leading the way, with more than 50 percent of students traveling to such exotic locations as Nairobi, Paris, Tokyo, Seoul and Santiago.

Journalism students who visited these and other locations were there to explore more than the local customs. They wanted to learn about the media environment, to connect with local professionals and to bring back their own stories.

The School of Journalism has sent nearly 100 students to five continents in the past year to visit news organizations, work with local students and professionals, and develop an understanding of those regions' media issues. And they wrote about what they learned, gathering news for blogs and class projects.

"We literally hit the ground running," wrote student Ryan Dorgan, who traveled to Kenya to report on the HIV/AIDS epidemic. "We covered the workings of an incredible organization. We covered real issues with real consequences affecting real people in hopes that, with our help, more people will come to know of the disastrous consequences of HIV."

Students in the Summer in London program attend a class, visit media outlets and work as interns for eight weeks, gaining on-the-job experience as well as learning to live as Londoners.

"From those two months, 90 percent of my memories will be about things that happened to me when I was on the job," wrote Thomas Miller of his internship and freelancing in London.

For many students, travel is a landmark event. Of 71 traveling students, not including those in the Summer in London program, 52 had never had a study abroad experience, 16 had never been overseas and one had never traveled by airplane.

"There are few things as educationally rewarding as observing students before, during and immediately after their travel abroad," said Dean Brad Hamm. "You can feel the excitement in Ernie Pyle Hall in the spring and summer as nearly 100 students study and travel to Asia, Africa, South America and Europe. The effect on their lives is remarkable and life-changing."

The travel courses fit with the vision for Indiana University put in place by IU's most famous president, Hamm said.

Arganbright gives \$1 million for journalism scholarships

Frank C. Arganbright lived in a neat 1940s house in a modest neighborhood of Lafayette, Ind., his lifestyle betraying no hint of the generous donation he had decided to give to the School of Journalism. But when he died in 2008, the former newspaper reporter and public relations professional left \$1 million to the school, the first single donation of at least \$1 million for scholarships from an individual in the history of the journalism school.

“Some donors are more public than others, and there’s no sense that Mr. Arganbright was intending to make a splash,” said journalism dean Brad Hamm. “He left this gift of \$1 million and said he just wanted to support public affairs journalism. He believed in journalism and he believed in IU. His gift will be effective for a very long time.”

Arganbright graduated from IU in 1949 and joined the staff of the (Lafayette, Ind.) *Journal and Courier*, starting as a reporter and working his way up to city editor. He left the paper in 1972 to become senior editor of the Purdue University Office of Public Information, remaining with the University News Service until 1985.

The journalism school awarded the first 10 Arganbright Scholarships this spring, each valued at \$1,000, but Hamm indicated that further use of Arganbright’s gift will be much more far-reaching and could include providing financial support so students can pursue opportunities outside of the classroom, including those abroad.

“Mr. Arganbright’s gift allows us to think about the best ways to encourage more reporting of public affairs and the creative ways that students might do that in the future,” Hamm said. “He might have imagined a world when he left here in 1949 of typewriters and hot type. He knew at the end of his life that’s not the future of these students, so he gave a gift based on the content rather than the tools ... I think that’s wise, because the methods might change in the future.”

Hetheringtons celebrate centennial with journalism school timeline

It's been 62 years since Susan Bassett Hetherington came to IU as a student in the High School Journalism Institute, and 57 years since she and her husband, Jim, graduated from the School of Journalism in 1953. Their son, Robert, followed in his parents' footsteps, earning his journalism degree in 1977.

The couple's decades-long ties to the school led them to establish the James and Susan Hetherington Scholarship and, more recently, to fund the installation of a display celebrating the centennial of the school. The display — a timeline depicting key moments in the school's history — will occupy the wall outside the auditorium in Ernie Pyle Hall, visible to the hundreds of students who pass daily through that second-floor corridor.

Susan Hetherington hopes that in these days of instantaneous communication, the timeline will give students pause as they contemplate the history and achievements of the school and its alumni. The Hetheringtons were part of the post-war John Stempel/Gretchen Kemp era, when Ernie Pyle was still a living memory for many. Jim was editor-in-chief of the *Indiana Daily Student* during his senior year, and Sue was a reporter and columnist, initiating the "500 Fever" column about the first Little 500 race.

Jim went on to work for the *Louisville (Ky.) Times*, the *Indianapolis Times* and WFBM radio and television. He moved to public relations in 1974, becoming public relations director and vice president for corporate communications for American United Life Insurance Co. in Indianapolis. Susan became executive director of Prevent Blindness Indiana and of Goodwill Industries of Central Indiana Auxiliary.

Susan says the two have stayed in touch over the years with their fellow journalism alumni in Indiana and elsewhere.

"It really was such a good crowd," she says.

The timeline, she says, "will help build the respect and enthusiasm of current students to see what has happened over the years, so that they have maybe a little greater appreciation for where they may go in the future."

High school students attend first Diversity Sports Media Institute

Eighteen high school students spent a week this summer at IU's National Sports Journalism Center at IUPUI interviewing nationally known coaches, athletes and media personalities and producing a sports TV show and multimedia website. The students were participants in the center's first Diversity Sports Media Institute, funded by a grant from the Chicago-based McCormick Foundation.



"The Diversity Sports Media Institute gave these students from Indianapolis and Chicago a real-world experience in sports media and showed them a career path in sports beyond the court or the playing field," said Tim Franklin, director of the National Sports Journalism Center and the Louis A. Weil Jr. Endowed Chair at the IU School of Journalism. "The hope is that this will become an annual event that eventually could help improve diversity in the sports media industry." The center is part of the School of Journalism.

During their week in Indianapolis, the students learned the fundamentals of sports journalism and practiced their skills by interviewing IU men's basketball coach Tom Crean, IUPUI men's basketball coach Ron Hunter, award-winning *Chicago Tribune* columnist Fred Mitchell, IU and NBA basketball Hall of Famer Isiah Thomas and TNT professional basketball reporter David Aldridge.

Participants stayed in campus housing at Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis. They toured Conseco Fieldhouse, home of the Indiana Pacers, and Lucas Oil Stadium, home of the Indianapolis Colts and the 2012 Super Bowl. They talked to WISH-TV reporter/anchor Chris Widlic and sat in on a newscast. And they worked with WFYI's staff and with institute instructors to create a 30-minute TV show, which will air on public television stations.

Students who completed the institute and who graduate from high school and attend college will receive a \$500 voucher from the McCormick Foundation. The most outstanding student this summer, Brandon Young, received a special scholarship award from Indiana University. Young, a graduate of Arsenal Tech High School in Indianapolis, will join the IU School of Journalism at IUPUI as a freshman this fall to study at the National Sports Journalism Center.

Reviews of the program were overwhelmingly positive. One student summed up the institute: "This is the best program I've ever been a part of. Thank you."
